

MUSIC

Practical Music Theory

Music theory is often seen as having little relevance to the way we experience music. This course will demonstrate that the opposite is true—that understanding the laws governing the art of sounds enhances our ability to appreciate, enjoy, and even remember music.

Reversing the traditional academic practice of moving from concepts to real music, we will start with concrete musical examples and seek to extract their theoretical background. A repertory of well-known themes, songs, and large-scale compositions (from *Greensleaves* to Beethoven's Ninth Symphony and from *Flight of the Bumble-Bee* to *Star Wars*) will serve as an introduction to the basic theoretical foundations of Western music.

Ilias Chrissochoidis studied piano, music theory, and musicology in Greece and the United Kingdom (King's College, London), and received a PhD in music from Stanford. A specialist in 18th-century music and culture, he has conducted sponsored research at Harvard, Yale, the University of Texas at Austin, UCLA, The Huntington, and the Folger Shakespeare Library. His articles have appeared in professional journals and collections of essays.

Miles Ahead: The Life and Musical Genius of Miles Davis

77 hat is it about Miles Davis that makes him figure as the most influential jazz musician since Duke Ellington? Composer, improviser, and visionary, Miles was at the forefront of almost every major development in jazz from 1945 to his death in 1991. Whether bebop, cool jazz, hard bop, modal jazz, fusion, funk or hip-hop, Miles was a catalyst, an enigma, a brilliant interpreter, and a great bandleader. Through his early work with Charlie Parker, his Birth of the Cool nonet, his first quintet, the classic recording Kind of Blue, the second quintet, or his fusion explorations, Miles was always ahead of his time, a cultural icon who spawned generations of players who continue to follow his lead today. Be prepared to be dazzled and enlightened as we take a journey into Miles Davis' music, and recapture—through rare recorded works, videos, and words—a snapshot of his genius.

Jazz pianist and composer Ken Berman has appeared on the famed stages of Carnegie Hall, Detroit's Fox Theater, The Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, and The Sunside in Paris. He has performed and recorded with Bob Moses, Yoron Israel, Kai Eckhardt, Akira Tana, John Lockwood, Bob Gullotti, and many others, and has been the recipient of several artist awards for his work in jazz education.
